Greetings Everyone,

It has been a while since we have prepared our department's newsletter. We are living in interesting times. The pandemic caused a shutdown of operations at the Pueblo of Acoma. There are so many things to share with you and it is almost impossible to write everything. So, I will focus on the main points.

We are preparing for the new school year. The Haak'u Community Academy and Haak'u Learning Center will start their school year on August 17. Rest assured that we have considered every option to safely provide an education to your student. We assembled a team of school staff and board members to develop a plan with three options that included, 1) hybrid model, 2) virtual, and 3) 100% face-to-face. The hybrid model is similar to what many other schools are doing where students do a portion of on-line instruction and the other would be face-to-face. The virtual instruction would offer a total on-line approach to learning. The 100% face-to-face is bringing the students back as 'normal'. We had to take many things into consideration but most importantly, the health and safety of students and staff. Our ultimate decision was to go back to school with a hybrid approach.

The hybrid approach includes providing virtual instruction for the first 9-weeks of school. This does not mean that the second 9-weeks will be face-to-face. We have assembled a school health committee that will meet on a weekly basis to monitor the pandemic and public health status which will guide our decision for the second 9 weeks of instruction.

Some questions have been raised by staff and community regarding personal protective equipment (PPE) and cleaning supplies available so that we have a safe environment. The Pueblo of Acoma Tribal Government received CARES Act funding and have graciously provided everything we need to keep everyone as safe as possible. But a lot of safety depends on the community, too. Everyone must continue to practice social distancing, wearing face masks, washing hands often, and obeying Governor Vallo's Executive Order. It is difficult to be away from family and friends who live off the Acoma reservation and not being able to do the fun things we enjoyed, but we will get back to living life the way we want once we get through the pandemic. So, please practice the safety guideline and reach out to your Tribal Departments if you need help.

Technology is another topic I want to share with everyone. Along with the CARES Act funding, we are able to purchase laptops and forms of temporary internet connections. The Department of Education is continuing to work with Grants Cibola County Schools (GCCS) and internet providers to help our students start off the school year with tools needed to learn. Virtual learning is new to most of us and we are doing our best to provide everyone with what they need during this time. I invite each of our readers who have questions about virtual learning and technology to call the Department of Education and talk to Leslie Vallo, Nolan Valdo, or myself.

I encourage everyone to be safe. Take care of yourself and others around you. I believe that this is a temporary situation only if we practice the health guidelines and obey the laws. Not wearing a face mask and gathering in large groups is irresponsible. I understand we miss our family and friends but we need to be safe and prevent the spread of this virus. 

- Social Security Card (Original)
- Certificate of Indian Blood
- Proof of Income for household member (past 6 months) individual or family household income (may include self-employment earning records, receipt of public assistance and disability benefits).
- Selective Service Registration (Male's Only)
- Proof of Residence (Physical & Mailing) within the Pueblo of Acoma (Contact Tribal Administration Support Staff)
- High School Diploma or GED Certificate
- If you are applying for educational support (i.e.: Associates Degree, Vocational Certificate, or Adult Basic Education or GED) a list of additional required documents will be given to upon application submittal.

Hello Acoma Students and Families,

As we approach the re-entry of all our children into school for the 2020-2021 school year, the Haak'u Learning Center (HLC) staff would like to remind everyone that the health and safety of our children is our top priority. In the month of July, the Acoma Board of Education approved re-entry plans for the HLC. The HLC will begin the school year following a Learn-at-home Model. The first day of school is scheduled for Monday, August 17, 2020. During this week, enrolled families can expect a visit from HLC teachers to begin delivering supplies and other introductory materials



for families and students. Although the beginning of this school year will be different than previous school years, the HLC is working to continually improve the quality of services provided to our families even if it is remotely. Our HLC teaching staff will be receiving training at the beginning of the school year to learn about the Learn-at-home Model and become more knowledgeable on various ways to deliver remote instruction to families. We are all looking forward to new and innovative ways in which we can deliver our services to all our enrolled families and hope that our families will be open to new ways of interaction.

The HLC is currently accepting enrollment applications. Families can call to the center to request for an enrollment application to be e-mailed however, the HLC is open from 9AM-4:30PM Monday through Friday. Applications can be picked up and dropped-off at the HLC. In this newsletter, there is a "HLC Back-to-School" flyer with more information.

If your child is currently enrolled in our program, you can expect a phone call from an HLC staff member to identify your child's teachers, answer questions, and share more about the HLC re-entry plan. When you enroll your child in our program, you can expect quick communication on what to expect for the 2020-2021 school year – ENROLL NOW!


- Haak'u Learning Center's first day of school for enrolled children will be Monday, August 17, 2020.

Keres Language Dictionary Project Update

The summer of 2020 has been a strange one indeed. A bit scary, a bit frustrating and a bit long. While it was frustrating and scary, the Keres Language Group pressed on with the dictionary project. Most of whom worked from home. Surprising how much can be accomplished while working via phone. We went through 7,400 words editing the dictionary. We are now on the third phase of editing. It is said that at least 8 to 10 edits are necessary before publishing a novel. Perhaps that goes the same for a dictionary, as we find more changes each time we review a word or phrase.

We find that when these almost virtually identical words and phrases are used in varying forms, the diacritical marks have to change and both have to appear in the dictionary as such.

We are also gearing up for the re-opening of our schools. While we are still in the midst of hybrid school or virtual school, we are preparing our share to teach Keres to the students of Haak'u Learning Center (Turtle) and Haak'u Community Academy. We find it necessary to teach our students Keres and culture to promote and enhance their academic achievements and promote self-confidence especially in these times of uncertainty.

As always, we look to you, the community, for your involvement and interest. We now have a new language building. Give us a week or two, to get the Center plumbed, electrified and stop by to see us. We are always looking for volunteers and help.

Continue your safety practices. We want our community and people to stay healthy and survive this pandemic.


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
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Welcome to School Year 2020!

A virtual start for the first nine weeks or more is an incredible beginning for a new school year and is one for the history books! However, we are striving to make this a safe and relevant start for our students and families. We have a great staff and Governing Board who have been working diligently since March 13th when notices went out that HCA was suspending operations until further notice due to COVID-19. Our Essential staff stayed on



since that time to clean and disinfect the facility, buses and all equipment while also helping to prepare and deliver lunches. Our Board has been meeting via zoom calls and been in constant touch with our Executive Director on a weekly basis concerning many issues regarding pre-school to adult education plans and issues. The principal and teaching staff have continued to work beyond the end of the past school year to develop plans for SY 2020-21. All of the plans had to include COVID-19 guidelines for the health and safety of students and staff. They have also been learning about a new method of teaching utilizing technology and strategies to teach their students. These are just some of the notable impacts. The process for improving began with learning more about COVID-19 and checking with the Center for Disease Control (CDC) on a daily basis and learning that there was not a lot known about this virus but to follow the recommendation of health officials who continue to stress that we must; wash our hands, wear a mask and maintain a social distance of 6 feet or more. That hasn't changed and we need to continue to practice these measures if we are to get back to some normalcy.

Some of the changes to support distance learning has been initiated and will be ready when school starts on August 17th. First of all, our students will have a laptop computer assigned to them and part of their work involves using the laptop. They will also continue to complete assignments much like homework. The teaching staff has been learning to use technology in a different way so it will be new for them as well. Second, our school has linked on to the recently installed fiber optic cable this summer and the school facility has been rewired and upgraded with CAT 6 cable. The school will now have wireless access out into the parking lot. As the year progresses there will be many more improvements made as students and staff become more proficient in using technology. However, it should be noted that while we have updated our technology at the school, the community as a whole still does not have the same access to the internet. But plans have been made to provide wireless access around the community which will allow students to receive and submit their school work.

Other notable changes include; our new Family and Childhood Education program (FACE) has recruited some families into the program. We have a new 21st Century Coordinator, Alton Autrey moving over from the Grants School District. Lastly, we will have a school website where community members can log on to learn about events and access information throughout the year. More information will follow to access the website. Gathering Voices: Tribal Youth Symposium on Education, Well-Being, and Culture

On July 14th to the 16th, the Acoma Department of Education hosted its first Youth Symposium on a virtual Zoom format for all Acoma tribal members near and far. It was an event created in the sole purpose of offering an opportunity for all Acoma members, especially the youth, to engage in conversation about their education, future careers, and how anxiety or worry from current global events can be healthy managed. Our guest speakers ranged in career diversity and were very pleased to take part in a successful event.

The first day of the Symposium was opened with a traditional address by our Governor, Brian Vallo, and the rest of the Acoma Tribal Administration. We had a series of speakers who found their own pathways on giving back to their communities while sharing their voice proudly as indigenous peoples. From Dr. Lee Francis, to Dr. Melissa Riley, Leslie Vallo, Christen Tenorio and Larissa Judd, our participants were enlightened about educational services our own tribe offers while feeling inspired to unleash their indigenous imagination in this great world.

The second day had a diverse range of presentations. There were conversations about our own beloved Keres language with Marietta Juanico, native college success with Michael Ray and Nathan Moquino, tribal law with Judge Randolph Collins, medical school guidance with Anya Cruz, film and photography with Johnathon Sims, and a live panel discussion with directors at our educational institutions: Haak'u Community Academy Principal Edwina Trujillo, Haak'u Learning Center Director KatieAnn Juancio, Acoma Learning Center Director Tracey Charlie, and Grants Cibola County Schools Representative Renee Sanchez. It was an exciting day as the Acoma people spoke first-hand with dedicated experts about what their profession is like, exploring new interests, and what the upcoming school year may look like with COVID-19.

The third day was focused on well-being and the importance of female representation in our communities. We had Jennifer Nanez share her expertise within the mental health field about ways we can keep busy while staying at home and practicing whole mind and body care. New Mexico State Representative Georgene Louis shared her journey through law school that led to her current successful career where she represents her district, the state, the tribe, and native women. Joseph "Brophy" Toledo shared beautiful stories about his own life and Jemez culture which blossomed into his teachings on how to keep oneself grounded during an unfortunate time. Thereafter, we closed the Symposium with an engaging Q & A segment with Tribal Administration. The questions they received from the public were within the areas of education, COVID-19 efforts, current events, and what each official wished to share with the people. They received good feedback and continued strength from the people.

It was a privilege to put together the first of many Symposiums to come. We cannot be thankful enough for the public and Department support in hosting this event which definitely upheld expectations and respect for the Acoma people and traditions. It was wonderful to see our Acoma people's faces and to be able to engage from afar. We meant for this event to wish wellness and confidence into the hearts of all and we absolutely saw it as the Symposium carried on. We look forward to how this event will inspire, encourage, and benefit our people in the years to come.

The academic school year is right around the corner, and we here at Haak'u Community Academy have spent a good amount of time over the summer preparing for your child(ren)'s safe return to classes. Initially, the plan was for limited in person attendance. However, with the rapid increase of COVID-19 cases in our state, the decision by the school board is to start school with computer-based, online instruction for the 1st quarter. There were many factors considered and, in the end, taking a slower cautious approach to bringing students and staff back to campus is safer and logical. What does that mean for our students and families? First of all, the school will checkout a computer laptop to each student. With the support from the Acoma Department of Education and tribal administration, the school expects "hot spots" (connection devices for the internet) to be placed in the community and possibly in HCA's parking lot for students to connect to the internet, if a household needs access.

As for instruction, HCA has decided to use Google Classroom, an online computer program that manages teacher assignments and student learning materials. Four days a week, Tuesday through Friday, students will meet live using video from the internet. A schedule of classroom meeting times will be provided so each grade level has a specific time slot for this live virtual session. In addition, teachers can provide "At-Home" work packets as another means for learning, followed up with teacher phone calls. In any case, the school administration and teachers are very committed in assisting parents and students in learning how to do school at home for the 1st quarter.

Our safety plan was developed with the CDC guidelines in mind, and when students do return to campus all persons will have to wear masks at all times. HCA's Re-entry plan for COVID-19 outlines safety guidelines and all requirements for being on-campus, and changes to bus transportation to ensure social distancing.
