The first week of school was exciting and at times, overwhelming, as we all learn how to manage teaching and learning remotely using technology. Seeing all our students online really warmed our hearts, and we welcome all the new students. HCA's enrollment has increased from about 160 to 170 students. We are so grateful for the guidance and patience given by parents and family members, as the students navigate Google Classroom and their work packet assignments. Getting Online

On Monday, August 17th, HCA distributed laptop computers to each student. The Acoma Department of Education partners with HCA in making sure all families can access the internet with reliable connectivity. For the most part, students are following the virtual online schedule and are attending their live sessions Tuesday through Friday with their homeroom teacher. Mondays, Mr. Hunt conducts his PE classes through assigned lessons on Google Meet. If there are any problems with the computer, contact Marcus Pino at 934-6243. If there are problems with Google Classroom, contact Mr. Autrey, Mr. Peterson, Mrs. Perez at 552-6671.

Monday Packet Drop Off and Pick Up

Every Monday our staff will collect completed work packets and pass out the next week's assignment from 8:00 A.M. to 2:00 P.M from the gym's west exit/entrance. Make sure the packets are clearly labeled with student names, grade and the assigned teacher. Thank you parents and care-givers for monitoring your child's learning.

Teacher Office Hours

Besides the 2:30- 3:30 P.M. office hours, teachers will now schedule Mondays for additional schoolwork help time. Check out teacher-parent letters for specific times. In addition, the 21st Century After-School Tutoring program coordination by Mr. Autrey is in the works, and should be up and running by the end of September. The goal is to have additional homework help and health and wellness activities available af-

ter 3:30 P.M. Enrichment and cultural lessons are integrated into activities. Stay tuned for more information.

VR -Virtual Reality /Bitmoji Classrooms

Using the Google Slides application, teachers created interactive classrooms where students can visit and click icons to access various online programs, supporting the teaching of core subjects. Programs like Epic, an online library of over 40,000

books, are available for students to explore, or read books assigned by the teacher in some VR Classrooms. The VR/Bitmoji Classrooms are located on the Google Classroom platform.

Lunch, Routines and Communication

Delivering lunch has been running smoothly and on schedule. Let the school know of any changes with your delivery.

Each teacher has sent home a daily schedule to help with class work completion and time management.

There are many ways to get answers to your questions, such as phone calls, text messages, and Google email. Attendance is vital to your child's success, so keep up the awesome job of helping students log on and enabling their cameras.








Online Moccasin Making





LETTERS ABOUT LITERATURE WRITING COMPETITION!

Polish up your <u>reflective</u> writing skills and write a letter to an author—living or dead—explaining how his or her work changed your view of yourself or your world.

THREE COMPETITION LEVELS:

Level 1: Grades 4, 5 and 6 Level 2: Grades 7 and 8

Level 3: Grades 9, 10, 11 and 12

Entry Deadline (all competition levels): January 11, 2021

HOW TO ENTER:

Review the official contest rules for entry details, specifically #6 through #9.

- Select a book that you have read and about which you have strong feelings or which has changed your view of yourself or the world.
- 2. Imagine sitting down with the author of this work and sharing your personal thoughts. Your letter should be reflective, personal and sincere, like a private conversation, not a book report or a fan letter.
- Share specific details about the book and about your reaction to the book.
- 4. Keep in mind that this is a <u>reflective</u> writing contest and that means you need to think about what you read and the meaning you gleaned from the author's words as well as the impact of those words upon you.
- 5. Type your letter. Use your first name ONLY in the signature.
- 6. Complete the entry form (see the next page) and staple it to the top of the first page of your letter.
- 7. Complete the permission form (see https://lettersaboutliterature.nmculture.org/) for all entries age 13 or under as of November 1, 2020.
- 8. Enclose your letter and the required form(s) in a letter-sized envelope. TEACHERS' NOTE: Please mail class sets in one large flat envelope 9" x 11" (or larger).
- 9. Indicate the competition level on the envelope—Level 1, or Level 2 or Level 3—depending on your grade. If you are submitting for more than one level, use a separate envelope for each level.
- 10. Mail your entry to:

- 11. Alternatively you may submit your entry electronically at NM.LAL@state.nm.us
 - Microsoft Word or PDF documents only will be accepted electronically.
 - Entry form and signed permission form for all entries age 13 or under as of November 1, 2020 are required for all electronic submissions and both must be sent as separate attachments.

AWARDS:

Winners in all three competition levels will be recognized at an awards ceremony and cash prizes will be awarded. The State Library will announce all finalists and winners and will publish the three winning letters on its website in April 2021. The awards ceremony will be held in Santa Fe in early May 2021. Due to COVID-19 please be advised that scheduling and venue for the awards ceremony are subject to change.

State winners in each competition level will receive a \$200 cash award; second place winners a \$100 cash award; third place winners a \$50 cash award; and honorable mention writers a \$25 award.

TOP 6 BENEFITS OF USING TECHNOLOGY IN THE CLASSROOM

It is important to acknowledge that students are already interested and engaged in using technology, this creates many amazing opportunities for schools and teachers to benefit from integrating some forms of technology in the classroom and to make teaching and learning more effective. Improves engagement - When technology is integrated into lessons, students are expected to be more interested in the subjects they are studying. Technology provides different opportunities to make learning more fun and enjoyable in terms of teaching same things in new ways. What is more, technology can encourage a more active participation in the learning process, which can be hard to achieve through a traditional lecture environment.

Improves knowledge retention - Students who are engaged and interested in things they are studying, are expected to have a better knowledge retention. As mentioned before, technology can help to encourage active participation in the classroom, which also is a very important factor for increased knowledge retention. Different forms of technology can be used to experiment with and decide what works best for students in terms of retaining their knowledge.

Encourages individual learning - No one learns in the same way because of different learning styles and different abilities. Technology provides great opportunities for making learning more effective for everyone with different needs. For example, students can learn at their own speed, review difficult concepts or skip ahead if they need to. What is more, technology can provide more opportunities for struggling or disabled students. Access to the Internet gives students access to a broad range of resources to conduct research in different ways, which in turn can increase the engagement.

Encourages collaboration - Students can practice collaboration skills by getting involved in different online activities. For instance, working on different projects by collaborating with others on forums or by sharing documents on their virtual learning environments. Technology can encourage collaboration with students in the same classroom, same school and even with other classrooms around the world.

Students can learn useful life skills through technology - By using technology in the classroom, both teachers and students can develop skills essential for the 21st century. Students can gain the skills they will need to be successful in the future. Modern learning is about collaborating with others, solving complex problems, critical thinking, developing different forms of communication and leadership skills, and improving motivation and productivity. What is more, technology can help develop many practical skills, including creating presentations, learning to differentiate reliable from unreliable sources on the Internet, maintaining proper online etiquette, and writing emails. These are very important skills that can be developed in the classroom.

Benefits for teachers - With countless online resources, technology can help improve teaching. Teachers can use different apps or trusted online resources to enhance the traditional ways of teaching and to keep students more engaged. Virtual lesson plans, grading software and online assessments can help teachers save a lot time. This valuable time can be used for working with students who are struggling. What is more, having virtual learning environments in schools enhances collaboration and knowledge sharing between teachers.

If you need access please call our office for the teacher's name, so we can let them know ahead of time.
