#### **Greetings Everyone,**

I hope that each of you are doing well. We just hit a milestone in this pandemic with one year of virtual education and support services. It has not been easy and we continue to find new ways to teach, learn, and support our students and community.

As we continue to wrap up another school year there are so many things to consider. How will we celebrate the end of the year? Will we go back to school in person or online? What can we do this summer? Ah, yes. So much to think about but we cannot positively and factually state that any in-person learning will happen next year or summer events will take place especially without everyone continuing to wearing their masks, social distancing, and avoiding large gatherings. It is a difficult time for everyone and I am most focused on our students, of all ages. As students begin to close out another school year and enter a new one – consider talking to your school-aged children about expectations that will be placed on them such as 1) getting up earlier, 2) doing homework on time and before due dates, 3) being around other students if we go back to in-person, and 4) becoming familiar with school rules, to name a few. Reintroductions back to school is going to take some time especially for our preschool and kindergarten students so everyone should take some time to talk about school and being in a classroom. When possible, take your student for a ride to the school or call your school principal and ask for a virtual meeting to find out more about COVID-safe practices or any other questions that help put your mind at ease.

Tis' the season for old and new traditions at the Department. We are preparing for our 2<sup>nd</sup> annual college fair that will take place in a virtual setting. We still want our students to get as much information as possible about college and career choices. But I also want to let parents and family know that it's okay if your student wants to enter the workforce instead of going directly to college or vocational school. It is important to let students make their decision about what feels right for them at this time, work or school. Sometimes students thrive post-secondary after they have had work experience that can guide their next steps in adult-hood. Being a mother and grandmother, I suggest that if your student chooses to go to college and away from home then there are some friendly reminders that I want to repeat. Please support your students time away to grow as a young adult by encouraging them to stay at school. Their time away from you and the community is a sacrifice they are making for their future. Students increase their likelihood of success when they commit time and attention to their studies when their support systems have consistent messages of staying at school, 'you will be home before you know it', 'we miss you too but everyone is okay and will see you soon'. Send care packages that include your student's favorite items and write an old-fashioned letter or send a card with some words of encouragement, happiness, and excitement.

As we begin to move into closing out another school year, I want to extend a sincere word of appreciation for our teachers, assistants, and child care providers. Their work with infants to school-aged students is positively impacting the lives of everyone by staying the course and leading young minds to greater possibilities. Please take some time to thank a teacher, assistant, or child care provider. We need them now and more than ever.

Finally, the Keres Language Program is setting a high mark by closing out our notorious Administration for Native Americans Grant by preparing the finishing touches to the on-line dictionary. Although we had an appealing online dictionary and social media application, we still had some words to add, edit, and revise. The new version of the dictionary will be a password protected site with some new features that include lesson plans for schools and students and a whole lot more. Look for more information in

future editions of the newsletter. Take care, be safe and follow the Pueblo of Acoma Executive Orders and any other State COVID requirements. Our return back to some sense of normalcy is depending on all of us.

Happy Springtime! There's excitement in the air. For those who enjoy gardening, it's time to prepare the land for crop planting. With brisk springtime breezes and hopefully some rain, April is also a time of renewal during the Easter season. At Haak'u Community Academy, the staff continues to prepare for the possibility of re-opening. In March "No-Contact Lunch" delivery has resumed for our students. Just a reminder, if no one comes to retrieve the lunches, it will not be left behind on porches. As for the school calendar, March 12 was the last day of the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter and report cards were sent in the mail. All concerns regarding your child's grades, behavior, and attendance should be addressed with the classroom teacher and school principal. Every effort has been made to keep parents informed of student progress and upcoming events, such as lesson topics and learning activities. Teachers are asking for parents to check their child's Google Classroom and Google Email every day for correspondence and other notices. Of course, phone calls and text messages sent between 7:30 A.M. and 6:00 P.M., are other ways to obtain needed information. As for student academic performance, students do a great job of logging in and participating in class discussions. In fact, there are students who have had perfect attendance since the beginning of this school year. We would like to recognize these students for their commitment and dedication to learning. #### Haak'u Learning Center News

Hello families,

March has come and gone but the Haak'u Learning Center (HLC) continues to make big steps as we begin to wrap up the 2020-21 school year. In the month of March, many of the major leaps that happened involve upgrades and restorations to the HLC. The HLC will soon be 20 years old and like everything else, is starting to show it's age. Some of you may know that our center has quite a bit of roof leaks and has needed roof repairs for quite some time. Although we do not get much precipitation, we have had enough to damage the inside walls of some classrooms. I am pleased to say that the roof repair project began on March 22, 2021 and is expected to be completed later this month. The HLC is thankful to the tribe for helping to fund this project so that all our present and future HLC students and families can enjoy the benefits. Once the roof is repaired, the HLC can focus on fixing the interior damage in the classrooms.

Another major project that started is the installation of automatic faucets and sinks throughout the building. While creating the HLC re-entry plan, the HLC considered large expenses that would help us further reduce the spread of COVID-19. In addition to installing automatic faucets and sinks, the HLC has installed automatic paper towel dispensers, automatic sanitizer wall mounts and free standing dispensers, 20 second hand washing timers, and will soon be installing automatic soap dispensers. The HLC has also increased the number of hand washing areas in each of the Head Start and two (2) child care classrooms. These upgrades will not only help reduce the spread of COVID-19 but will also help reduce the spread of all diseases that are commonly spread in Early Childhood Centers.

As the HLC continues to prepare for re-entry of our students and full re-entry of our staff, we continue to build our anticipation of being reignited with all the children. During the month of March, I had one-to-one conversations with all our teachers. It was evident during those conversations that the teachers continue to miss the children and are mentally ready to transition back to the classroom. Although I still do not know when that will be, please know that the HLC will continue to immerse ourselves in our re-entry plan. The month of April will be heavily focused on learning more about the Hybrid Model. More information for families will soon be coming...stay tuned!

Native American of a federally recognized tribe living on or near the Acoma Reservation looking to get trained, gain employment experience, or educational services, you may qualify for our program.

Please bring the following documents when returning your application for WIOA services. This information will be used in the eligibility determination process.

#### **Required Documents:**

- Proof of Age (Tribal, State or Federal Document)
- Valid State of New Mexico Drivers License or ID
- Social Security Card (Original)
- Certificate of Indian Blood
- Proof of Income for household member (past 6 months) individual or family household income (may include self-employment earning records, receipt of public assistance and disability benefits).
- Selective Service Registration (Male's Only)
- Proof of Residence (Physical & Mailing) within the Pueblo of Acoma (Contact Tribal Administration Support Staff)
- High School Diploma or GED Certificate
- If you are applying for educational support (i.e.: Associates Degree, Vocational Certificate, or Adult Basic Education or GED) a list of additional required documents will be given to upon application submittal.

### Keres Language Group News

Guuw'aadzi hauba, gaidawa tredraidraasrka

Happy t'iitra (Spring), to all. Soon the sh'amə (wild parsley) will be sprouting, your walks can result in a delicious meal.

Last month we looked at words/phrases which need additional words to fit the description such as the word "ain'ə" which means a location downward. This word "ain'ə" is actually made up of two words; ai meaning there; n'ə meaning down and it comes from the word "n'əgami" (down)

Much like the English language we have singular, dual and plural words and phrases.

dzuuku - he/she went, left (one person went, left)

ts'eeyu - they went, left (two people went, left)

dze'eku - they went, left (more than two people went, left)

cha'aidze - he/she went to bed (one person went to bed cha'aidzim'ətyə - they went to bed (two people went to bed) cha'datra - they went to bed (more than two people went to bed)



We use singular, dual and plural words, phrases and sentences when addressing or talking to people.

chuguiya - to tell one person to sit down
chuguiyanatyə - to tell two people to sit down
cha'aata - to tell more than two people to sit

There are words which are singular and words which are both dual and plural such as:

chupe - telling one person to eat dra'ape - telling more than one person to eat

kuupe- one person ate gaa'ape - more than one person ate

ga'au - lady addressing one sister ga'autiitra - lady addressing more than one sister

dyumə - man addressing one brother dyumətiitra - man addressing more than one brother

## Program Information

As part of honoring and embracing leadership and education, corn POLLEN was utilized by Southwestern tribes in recognition of the outstanding leadership attributes of tribal members, and to pray for all living things, as well as educational success and persistence.

Recognizing the importance of pathways to community and educational leadership, the University of New Mexico is pleased to announce the POLLEN program. Funded by, and in partnership with the New Mexico Legislature, the POLLEN Program is designed to increase the number of licensed school administrators serving Native American students throughout the state of New Mexico.

The Educational Leadership Program at the University of New Mexico is actively recruiting our fourth cohort of eligible educators in Native American serving schools who hold an MA degree to pursue their Administrative Licensure. Those admitted to the cohort will receive a stipend covering tuition, books, and technology fees in this accelerated pathway to licensure.

The anticipated cohort start date is Summer 2021. Required coursework will be specifically designed to prepare future principals to be responsive to the needs of Native communities throughout the State of New Mexico. All courses will be delivered through a blended online/face-to-face format to ensure access to communities throughout the state, and will center on Native American leadership, vision, epistemology, and culture in addressing current issues in Native American education.



## Eligibility Requirements

You are eligible to apply to this program if you meet the following criteria:

- Possess a valid Level IIA or IIIA New Mexico
   Teaching license
- Masters degree from a regionally accredited college/university.
- Native American and interested in becoming a licensed school administrator.
- 4) Commit to serving as a school administrator in a Bureau funded school or district predominantly serving Native American students.

## Program of Study

By participating in this program, students will be required to complete the following courses for New Mexico Administrative licensure and earn an Educational Specialist Certificate (24 credit hours):

LEAD 503 – Data Informed Instructional Leadership (3 hours)




